From Pastor Andersen:

On April 17, 1998, I was ordained into the Ministry of Word and Sacrament at Magnolia Lutheran Church in Seattle. The liturgy was the first ordination of the newly created Northwest Washington Synod and for me the culmination of four years of study, prayer, parish internship, hospital chaplaincy – and waiting. Our new national church was in a waiting mood and had been for some time, as we approached merger to combine some of the US Lutheran family alphabet soup: ALC, LCA, and AELC. The flowing together of pension plans, publishing houses, women's organizations, auxiliary ministries, colleges, universities and seminaries took effect earlier that year, but the consequences were to be worked out over months and years.

Seminarians were affected during that time; while senior clergy stayed put; synod and district staffs were reshaped into new arrangements. It was an uncertain period in the history of the Lutheran movement in the US.

Twenty-five years later, those seem to be the good old days. Memories of uncertainty, institutional anxiety, fiscal stress and leadership crisis have softened and/or matured. We have survived the turn of the century, which, it turns out was less a turn of century than it was the awareness that things would never be the same again in the life of the church. Ecumenical relations, social teachings on human sexuality, the social and political influence of the so-called "religious right" made for great craters in our church family landscape.

It's providential that the Wednesday Bible study group is working through the Book of Acts just now – just at a time when we're also hearing those Acts lessons from the Sunday lectionary. Acts is first and foremost the Book of the Church. Acts is what the men and women of the early church did after the "two men in white robes" admonished them to take their spiritual hands out of their pockets and look in new ways for the return of Jesus, or better said, to be part of that return themselves (Acts 1:10-11).

Acts is what we do as well in our time and place, when we've finished the larger part of the festival year and get into that time called "ordinary time" in the church year. It is an annual cycle, but it is also a life cycle.

Members of your church council will be meeting on retreat early this month, for some looks back but for more looks around and forward. I'm looking forward to looking forward. We invite you to do that too!

Church Council Highlights

From the meeting on April 16

CDC REPORT: Fundraiser was successful with \$2,000.00 raised, 68 people in attendance, 1/3 of the parents and some people from St. James. Enrollment is steady and full for the CDC and Patrick is looking to hire another kindergarten summer teacher. Windows are washed. Floors are being waxed on April 19th, with St. James floors being done at the same time.

TREASURER'S REPORT: It was a good month and a good quarter. This March is the best in 5 years and a 'well done' to staff for a job well done in the 1st quarter.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Proposed Ed and Ruth Ostrom for membership which passed unanimously and a new member service is being planned for the month of May. Downtown pastors were gratified with turnout of 70-90 people at the Lenten Soup Suppers and Services. The Ensemble performed at St James on April 22nd and would like to schedule other performances here. Pastor attended a day long "Boundaries" workshop that is required of pastors every 5 years.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: June 9th St. James will have a celebration of Ordained Ministry, this is at Pastors Dennis' request so all in Ordained Ministry will be included. Insurance bids are being worked on and should be received either at the end of April or beginning of May.

OTHER BUSINESS: Communications Team has developed a Privacy and Policies Document which will be reviewed by legal counsel.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE: St James Apartments fixed the planter so there is no standing water in the courtyard. Talked about a possible capital fund drive for the Property Committee.

Bach Vespers: June 2

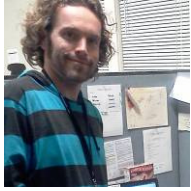
