

The four children, Mohammad Ali, Diant, Maryam, and Behtarin were overjoyed. The Zada family will join us for coffee hour on Sunday, January 7. Come and meet them!







#### **Lutheran World Relief: Did You Know?**

In **GAZA**, your love is delivering \$100,000 worth of hygiene items to those without access to basic necessities. These kits include feminine hygiene products, diapers, laundry powder and garbage bags.

In **LEBANON**, you are caring for neighbors who have been displaced due to the conflict in Israel and Gaza. Emergency food is being delivered to at least 1,000 children, women and men. We are exploring the options for a shipment of LWR Quilts, Personal Care Kits and Baby Care Kits.

In **LIBYA**, your love is sheltering families from the cold. Tents, tarps and winter clothes are reaching 2,000 neighbors that lost their homes in the devastating floods in September.

In **MOROCCO**, your kindness is delivering mattresses, blankets and insulated tents for more than 2,000 survivors of the 6.8 magnitude earthquake that devastated families and homes in September.

- **Did you know**...On his 3rd Missionary Journey, St. Paul sailed to the island of Kos where Hippocrates (the Father of Medicine) held his "medical school" under a tree?
- Have you been...to the Spanish exclave of Ceuta in North Africa where bronze dragons protect the hotel?
- **Did you know**...that the oldest university in Europe is located in Bologna, Italy?
- Have you Worshipped...at Sacre Coeur Basilica on All Saints Day as Paris' evening lights began to glow?

Join Pastor David as he shares these events through the words and images of his fifty days of travel...and be willing to share a story of your sacred places.



Pastor Mark Brocker will lead us in worship on Sunday, January 28. He will also present at Open Space on January 28 and February 4 with a series titled, **Dietrich Bonhoeffer: Faith Under Fire**. Regarding the series, Pastor Brocker writes,

"Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Lutheran pastor and scholar, was executed by the Nazis on April 9, 1945, for his role in a plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler. Bonhoeffer's life and writings teach us a great deal about what it means to be a faithful witness under fire. What we learn from Bonhoeffer is that there is no formula for being a faithful witness, especially in the most difficult circumstances. In the end, for Bonhoeffer, God's faithfulness is the firm ground on which we stand through the most severe tests of our faith."

# **December Council Meeting Highlights**

Treasurer's Report: The month of November showed a deficit with cash receipts on track but expenditures unusually high, some due to heating. Pastor's Report: New members will be received in early March. From Ash Wednesday through Pentecost there will be a Wednesday noon Eucharist service followed by a study session. Habitat Project funds, which we have held for several years will be split evenly between an ongoing Habitat (or similar) project and Camp Lutherwood. Some congregation members have requested new vent covers for the air vents between the choir loft and the piano. President's Report: The congregational meeting is scheduled for Sunday, January 21, 2024 and will include elections. There are three openings on Council and two openings on the Endowment Committee. Carl will have a proposed budget for the annual meeting. Note that the CDC will increase its contribution. With increasing attendance, preparing for coffee hour may become more difficult. Pastor suggests that at a minimum, coffee should be paid as a regular budget item, rather than depending on WELCA contribution. Some building concerns: New Advent lighting is up and working. Some asbestos was uncovered in the basement and will have to be dealt with by licensed specialists. The Fire Marshall wants us to clean the heads of 68 sprinklers.

# Helping the Unsheltered with Food Boxes and Winter Coats

Due to your generous financial gifts to the "Pastor's Discretionary Fund" we purchased two dozen warm coats for our houseless neighbors. We distributed these coats on the South Park blocks and to our houseless neighbors who attended the spaghetti dinner in the Pioneer Chapel on Friday, December 16. We also continue to provide food boxes 5 days a week at 11:30am to those in need who gather in the park, just steps from our St. James doors. This month we will gather to prepare food boxes on **Tuesdays, January 2 and 16 at 10am in Pioneer Chapel**.

# Wednesday Noon Eucharist Returns

We gather for Noon Eucharist and the Imposition of Ashes on **Ash Wednesday, February 14** as the Season of Lent begins. Then join us every Wednesday following for Noon Eucharist in Pioneer Chapel and a Bible Exploration Class led by Pastor David. These events will continue until the Festival of Pentecost in May.

# **Hiring New Administrative Assistant**



# Caring For Creation: Reflections on James Walvin's book A World Transformed: Slavery in the Americas

# and the Origins of Global Power

I finished this recently published book in my attempt to become "woke." It explains the global impact of the enslavement of Africans in the West over more than four centuries. The Papacy authorized Portugal's enslavement of Africans in 1452. By 1560, 30,000 Africans had been shipped to Hispaniola where Columbus had first set foot. At the end of the slave trade in the Americas in 1867, 12  $\frac{1}{2}$  million Africans had been embarked to the Americas with goods from all over Europe having been used to trade for Africans.




With the abolition of the Atlantic slave trade in 1808 in the U.S, enslaved families in the U.S. were brutally broken and marched, often in chains, from the Old South to the expanding cotton plantations in the west: a total of ½ million persons by 1860. Cotton production accounted for much of the wealth of the United States and Europe in the 19th century. Cotton was transported on ships owned by New Englanders to textile mills in New England and Europe. The cotton brokers and financiers resided in New York City. Lancashire's cotton mills, the primary driver of Britain's industrial revolution, received the vast bulk of its cotton from the U.S. Raw cotton arrived in Liverpool and resulting textiles departed through Liverpool which had earlier risen to prominence as a center of the slave trade. Sugar production in the Americas led to the rise of tea and coffee consumption and subsequent importation from China of porcelain ware for serving sugar in Europe and the Americas. Mahogany was harvested on the backs of the enslaved in the Caribbean and Central America and shipped to Europe and the U.S. for the manufacture of fine furniture.

The next time I am in a museum and see an exquisite Chippendale mahogany table set with fine China from the 19th century, I will consider that these pieces represent the great wealth of the world that came about due to the enslavement of Africans.


# **Sunday Refreshment Hosts and Altar Flower Sponsors**
