At St. James, we just moved from forty days of Lent to the fifty days of the Easter season. We have also moved into what was seemingly impossible: Easter.

In Lewis Carroll's 1871 story <u>Through the Looking Glass</u>, the Red Queen proclaimed to Alice that she often believed as many as six impossible things before breakfast. Easter, for us, is therefore not just a day, but rather experiencing the Risen Christ's presence as the impossible becomes pregnant with possibilities. We hear that life bursts from the barriers of death. As a St. James congregation, that may look like:

"The Oregonian" newspaper on Easter day ran an article concerning the decline of downtown Portland churches. At St. James, we are growing! Does that seem impossible? Uncertainty and confusion out of Washington D.C. are rattling businesses and stock markets. We respond with feeding those in need, calling on our elected officials to be true to democracy, and bringing hope to the refugee. Suddenly, the impossible becomes possible.

I don't know what others usually do before breakfast, but at St. James we believe six impossible things. And the Easter Risen Christ is leading the way!

Our Oregon Synod (99 ELCA churches in the state) declared itself a "Sanctuary Synod" some years ago. Following in Christ's welcome to all, we continue to be a welcoming place of safety and hope for the refugee. At the April meeting of the St. James Council, policy language was composed for both our St. James Church and Child Development Center. The policy is posted on the bulletin board in the church office area.

Youth Confirmation

Our five confirmation students will meet with Pastor David on Mother's Day, **May 11**, for an 11am lunch, followed by a class on The Ten Commandments and how they are intended to protect God's good gifts. These classes continue monthly through October. On Reformation Sunday, October 26, our students will publically affirm their baptism and confirm their faith.

Helping the Unsheltered with Food Boxes

Join us on **Tuesdays, May 13** and **27** at **10am** in **Pioneer Chapel** to pack food boxes for our neighbors. If you are interested and available to take out food on Fridays, please let the front desk know.



St. James and the Portland Pride Festival

April Council Highlights

Treasurer's Report: March income was \$43,109.26. Congregational giving was great and the highest in the month of March in the last 17+ years.

Pastor's Report: There was great attendance for Easter on April 20, with 166 in person and 48 for Jazz Vespers. This year marks the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed. Dave Brauer-Rieke will lead two Open Space classes on May 18 and May 25. Endowment Request by Eco Social Justice Committee: The committee requested \$2,500 to purchase supplies to provide 200 meals to go and 200 snack packages for the food pantry program at Portland Community College (PCC) for students during the summer months. Motion passed. Pastor Knapp gave updates on the formation of the two task forces who will lead the St. James 135th anniversary of ministry:

1. Look Back with Gratitude

Reception/Meal, Guest Preacher, Building Improvements, and Updated Membership Directory

2. Look Forward to Ministry Ahead

Mission Statement Review, St. James Lay Visitation Team, and Ministry Fair

Committee's Report: Charlotte Cook would like to pack the Box Car health kits on May 1 at 4pm so that they will be sent out the following few days.

Other Business: Carol Bergen has added additional information to the Know Your Rights draft for the St. James Lutheran Church Policy for being a Sanctuary Church. This includes What to Do During an ICE visit, Oregon DOJ Civil Rights Unit Sanctuary Promise Toolkit, Portland Public Schools (PPS) directive that the St. James CDC follows, Sanctuary States, and Federal Judges in the Portland Metro Area. Motion passed and posted on office bulletin board.

Boxcar Project

On **Thursday, May 1,** we prepared Personal Health Kits for those in need around the globe via Lutheran World Relief. Charlotte Cook brought items (towel, soap, toothbrush, etc.) for us to pack, and then on Friday, area Lutheran churches will packed a semi-truck that will be placed on a boxcar and shipped.




St. James Joins the 2025 CROP Hunger Walk

ELCA Signs the Ash Wednesday Ecumenical Declaration

Did you miss the news about the Ash Wednesday Ecumenical Declaration in support of refugees? The ELCA and many other denominations, along with

numerous individual leaders, signed on. It begins:

Together in faith and rooted in love, we resolve to continue in the centuries-old practice of Christian communities walking alongside refugees and immigrants in their pursuit of safety and dignity. We pledge to restore and promote hospitality and welcome to those seeking refuge - regardless of where they are from, how they pray or what language they speak.

The Declaration goes on, calling us to consider what it means to follow Jesus. Sometimes when we hear stories of Jesus feeding or healing people, we miss or overlook the fact that the recipients of his help were "others" – non-Jewish residents in the country. [Matthew 8:5-13 and 15:21-28, Luke 17:11-19] The readings that accompany the celebration of Passover remind participants, over and over again, to remember that they were once foreigners and refugees. In our own time and place, refugees and immigrants are harmed by misinformation and fearmongering while our government turns on its head our historic commitment to welcome

newcomers, symbolized by the Statue of Liberty.


