Don't Get Caught

There has been an increase in phishing attempts recently. Whenever you get a text or email from an unknown source, take caution. Here are some steps to take if you are contacted by anyone with request:

- **Compare** the sender's info with what you know.
- **Contact** the supposed sender using info you have used before or know to be accurate.
- Be **Cautious** in giving out any personal information or fulfilling any requests.
- **Confirm** it's spam, then report and delete/block the sender.

No one from St. James will ever reach out directly via text or email with a "special request" or "favor" or you to purchase gift cards or anything of that sort.

Eco Social Justice



One of my favorite spiritual writers is Sister Joan Chittister. As we are thinking about our stewardship to our community, these words held special meaning for me. They are from her book "The Gift of Years."

She writes that "each of us leaves a legacy."

In modern society, to leave a legacy ordinarily means to specify the distribution of property to heirs according to terms described in a legal document. It's a relatively rare event for most people to be mentioned in a will.

What we are inclined to forget is that each of us leaves a legacy, whether we meant to, whether we want to or not. Our legacies are the quality of the lives we leave behind. What are we leaving behind? That is the question that marks the timbre of a lifetime.

We leave behind our attitude toward the world. We are remembered for whether or not we inspired in others a love of life and an openness to all of those who lived with us. We will be remembered for our smiles and our frowns, for our laughter and our complaints, for our kindness and for our selfishness.

We leave behind for all the world to see the value system that marks everything we do. People who never ask us directly what we valued in life never doubt for a moment what it was. They know if we cared for the Earth because they watched us as we seeded our flowerbeds. They know what we thought of people of other colors or creeds by the language we used and the lives we connected with. They know the depth of our spiritual life by the way we treated those around us and what we thought of life and what we gave ourselves to doing.

Our legacy is far more than our fiscal worth. Our legacy does not end the day we die. We have added to it every moment of our lives.

Israel Annoh, a renowned master drum set player and percussionist from Ghana, West Africa currently resides in Portland. His music derives from a combination of Ghanaian and West African music and jazz artists Max Roach, Cosy Cole, and Elvin Jones.

Mike Horsfall has enjoyed a successful and diverse musical career for over 35 years, serving as an educator, composer, arranger, recording artist and concert soloist on both piano and vibraphone.



Kevin Deitz is an active jazz and classical bassist, composer/arranger, educator, clinician and adjudicator. He currently teaches Music Theory, Aural Skills, Music Fundamentals, Music and the Media, and History of Rock and Roll at Clackamas Community College.

Bach Cantata Vespers

Please join us on November 9, at 4pm, as we begin our 18th season of Bach Cantata Vespers with one of Bach's earliest cantatas, "Gottes Zeit ist die allerbeste Zeit." This work (BWV 106), calls for two Viola da Gambas, two recorders, organ, soloists, and choir, and is often referred to as Bach's first masterpiece. The work was written for the funeral of a former mayor of Mühlhausen in 1708. The text blends old and new testament passages, as well as individual verses of hymns by Martin Luther and Adam Reusner.


